

In 2013-2014, the OYO budget was nearly \$900,000, employing 18 persons. \$410,000 in municipality and school system funds were used to leverage an additional \$446,000 in grant funds, slightly better than a 1 to 1 match.


Annual Report

2013-2014

The Central Shenandoah Valley Office on Youth is a regional government agency serving Staunton, Waynesboro, and Augusta County. The OYO has served the community since 1977 and is committed to providing resources and services to area youth and their families.

In collaboration with Augusta County Public Schools, the OOH received a three-year, \$180,000 grant from the Virginia Foundation for Healthy Youth. Through this grant every student in grades 4—8 in Augusta County received programming designed to prevent substance abuse. The grant also supported a new and innovative physical education curriculum called SPARK. SPARK has revolutionized physical education by encouraging lifelong activity and nutrition over traditional team sports.


The Office on Youth provided leadership training and financial support to **all 6** area high school Student Against Destructive Decision (SADD) clubs. 6 schools received funding in support of their after-prom party and 5 schools sent **12 students** to a week long summer conference designed to train youth how to take the lead at their school to prevent underage drinking and drug abuse.

Juvenile Crime Control

Crime Control Staff oversee a variety of programs and services for court-involved youth. Services are designed to deter juvenile crime and provide alternatives to detention. In 2013-2014, services were provided to **241** youth.
