

In 2013-2014, the OOY budget was nearly \$900,000, employing 18 persons. \$410,000 in municipality and school system funds were used to leverage an additional \$446,000 in grant funds, slightly better than a 1 to 1 match.

The Central Shenandoah Valley Office on Youth is a regional government agency serving Staunton, Waynesboro, and Augusta County. The OOY has served the community since 1977 and is committed to providing resources and services to area youth and their families.

In collaboration with Augusta County
Public Schools, the OOY received a threeyear, \$180,000 grant from the Virginia
Foundation for Healthy Youth. Through
this grant every student in grades 4—8 in
Augusta County received programing
designed to prevent substance abuse.
The grant also supported a new and
innovative physical education curriculum
called SPARK. SPARK has revolutionized
physical education by encouraging
lifelong activity and nutrition over
traditional team sports.



The Office on Youth provided leadership training and financial

support to **all 6** area high school Student Against Destruc-

tive Decision (SADD) clubs. 6 schools received funding in support of their after-prom party and 5

schools sent **12 students** to a week long summer conference designed to train youth how to take the lead at their school to prevent underage drinking and drug abuse.
