Dear Community Member,

The Central Shenandoah Valley Office on Youth (OOY) was formed in 1978 with the purpose of crossing government and organizational boundaries to foster collaborative efforts to prevent juvenile delinquency and develop youth programs. OOO staff accomplish this through a balance of direct service to youth and active support of other government and community agencies.

In 2016-2017, OOO staff served 5,763 youth or 34% of all school age youth in the region in a face-to-face encounter. This represents a slight increase (9%) over the number of youth served in 2015-2016.

In 2016-17, the OOO aided the work of 21 different local government departments, working to address the needs of youth. The OOO multiplies the resources of non-profit and government departments increasing the efficiency at which our community addresses the needs of youth. In addition, the OOO partnered with 4 federal and state government agencies.

The OOO fosters collaborative efforts with local nonprofit organizations to cultivate programs and services that will operate outside the realm of government funding. Last year, the OOO organized three (3) meetings that brought together over 25 different nonprofits to network and facilitate communication. The OOO provided nonprofits with training opportunities focusing on enhancing program quality and strengthening managerial skills.

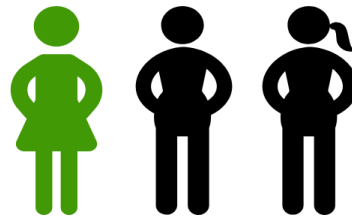
OOO staff appreciate your continued support of our efforts to keep our community a great place to raise children.
